GOALS for participation in a Socratic Seminar:

- ★ **Listen** – Whether you are in the inner circle or the outer circle, show you are listening by sitting up, looking at the speaker, and being otherwise visibly engaged.
- ★ **Participate**
 - **Inner Circle:** Make sure you and everybody else in the inner circle shares their ideas. Jump in, and encourage others to do so as well. Be sure to paraphrase what the previous person has said before responding.
 - **Outer Circle:** Complete your assigned role sheet.
- ★ **Clearly state your opinion** – Explain what you think. What is your argument or reasoning in response to the questions posed?
- ★ **Use evidence by citing the text** – Refer to both big ideas and specific details from the text to explain your opinion and reasoning. Use quotes!
- ★ **Paraphrase and respond to others** – Build off of others' comments. Use language such as, "What I heard you say was...", "I agree/disagree, because...", "Building on what (name) said, ...", etc.
- ★ **Ask questions** – Use the questions from this sheet, your previous work, your thinking on the spot, or even simply "Can you explain more?"

EVALUATION of your participation:

Scoring Guide

A = I'm a **model**! Check me out to see just how it's supposed to be done.

B = I did a **good** job! I could step up my game a little bit to really be a model for others.

C = I did it just **fine**, but there were **things I could improve** to be a better participant.

D = I did it a **little bit**, but I have a **lot of room for improvement**.

F = I didn't do it at all.

- A Paraphrased and responded directly to others' ideas in a respectful manner.
